POs

- 6.1 POs train their leadership of the content of C189, and C190 to spread knowledge among the target group and advocate its ratification by decision-makers.
- 6.2 POs train their leadership in utilising online resources for distance learning, advocacy and campaigning.
- 6.3 POs increase the visibility of erosion of core democratic values and workers' rights.
- 6.4 POs increase their thematic and technical knowledge on social security, social protection systems, and tax systems.
- 6.5 POs carry out relevant research, studies and investigations, for example on pension funds for domestic workers.
- 6.6 POs increase their knowledge on matters related to project management, for example planning, monitoring and evaluation.
- 6.7 POs increase their capacity to for administration and financial management, for example book-keeping.
